Before we address the regular business of this meeting, I'd like to acknowledge that we are today gathered on the traditional territory of the Algonquin Anishinaabe, lands never ceded or surrendered in peace to the Crown of Canada. Indigenous peoples living under the modern colonial state of Canada have suffered disproportionate injustice and marginalization. A mere land acknowledgement is not enough to make reconciliation and reparation to the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island. We must stand in solidarity against colonialism and remember our responsibility to the land and the peoples who have kept it for generations—which means affirming their call for the free and unencumbered return to their ancestral land. It is also fitting, for this body of lawmakers, to remember the spirit and wisdom of Indigenous governance models—from the collaborative bicameralism of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy to the consensus-based government of the Inuit—to deliver to students a better student union.

- Our new partnership with Carleton PIRG has added \$1,800 to the CUSA Think Tank's budget. This money will help offset expensive printing costs, research incentives, and increase their total honorarium. Thank you PIRG!
- Worked with UAC and the VPSL to amend and pass an organization-wide
 Harm Reduction Policy! Thank you UAC!
- Thank you PRC members and the PRC chair for your valuable feedback and amendments to the *Advocacy Policy* and *Think Tank Terms of Reference*
- Launched our Student Budget Snapshot Survey last week and have 36 responses so far!

Challenges and Barriers:

- Very little engagement or movement on the parking file, as our contact has been on holiday, will follow-up on their return this week
- I've been off on PTO for a bit; usually up at camp or fishing/hiking, so playing a bit of catch-up on the days when I returned

1. Key Priorities & Goals: Updates on Progress Toward Major Priorities

Student Discount Card Expansion

→ Significantly scaled up the SDC program - agreements and Google Forms were sent to businesses, with a goal of onboarding 70 businesses this year. As of now, we have successfully onboarded 74 businesses across 90+ locations. This priority was the main focus throughout August.

Partnership Development

→ Signed a conditional contract with TD Bank to rent out the Wing space, pending approval from the university's CARC Committee. Additionally, finalized contracts with Teslica and Mad Radish.

Generating Additional Revenue

→ Continued working with the President and a realtor to lease underutilized CUSA

spaces and establish sustainable revenue streams. We are still in the process of searching for suitable tenants.

Financial Oversight & Forecasting

→ The BDO audit is proceeding smoothly, with only a few final items outstanding. We anticipate receiving BDO's official assessment by the first week of September.



Bounce Platform Integration

→ Bounce remains a key strategic priority for this year. We held multiple meetings with VPSL, VPI, and the Bounce team to assess platform features and initiate early steps. However, no major updates this month as we await the COC's planning

resumption and the official appointment of the Board.

2. Highlights & Wins: Notable Successes Since the Last Report

- Officially onboarded 74 businesses into the SDC program, surpassing last year's total of 38. Every key performance indicator (KPI) assigned to the SDC program has been successfully achieved.
- Signed a conditional leasing contract with TD Bank, marking a major milestone in CUSA's space revenue efforts.

3. Challenges & Barriers: Key Issues and How They Are Being Addressed

❖ SDC Follow-Up & Workload Business follow-up continues to be time-consuming, with varied response rates. Due to staffing limitations from internal restructuring, I've personally managed much of the marketing and outreach work. The goal is to build a solid foundation this year, making it easier for next year's team to scale and manage the program. The SDC remains one of CUSA's most direct-value services to students.

Fortunately, the recent onboarding of a part-time Social MediaCoordinator last week has provided relief by supporting content creation for SDC posts, reels, and stories on Instagram.

Bounce Integration Challenges



While Bounce holds promise for streamlining club operations and improving engagement, onboarding and implementation remain complex due to time constraints and limited resources. My primary focus is on shifting the manual club funding process handled by the finance office to an automated model through Bounce. Discussions are ongoing to support smooth integration and address any concerns.

(C-50) Motion to Condemn Israel's plan to Occupy Gaza City and Annex The West Bank

Whereas, Israel has announced a planned military operation to seize Gaza City, the largest urban centre in the Gaza Strip, calling up tens of thousands of reservists in preparation.

And whereas, the Knesset (unicameral legislature of Israel) has voted in a 71-13 ceremonial decision to occupy the West Bank which is a clear violation of International law.

And whereas, the operation is expected to lead to the further displacement of Palestinians, adding to the already catastrophic toll of over 61,000 Palestinian deaths reported by health officials in Gaza since October 2023

And whereas, there's been significant pushback from human rights groups including Amnesty International and Israeli civilians who are protesting against the continuation of violence.

Be it resolved that, The University Affairs Committee affirms CUSA's Solidarity with the Palestinian people and recommends Council does the same.

Be it resolved that, CUSA wants to see a permanent ceasefire, all humanitarian corridors open along with the free flow of aid through Gaza, and the return of all hostages.

(C-51) Motion in Support of Palestinian Journalists

Whereas CUSA represents over 1,000 Communication and Journalism students who we believe are entitled to the fundamental right to report freely, accurately, and without fear of violence or repression;

Whereas according to Wear the Peace Israel has murdered a journalist every three days since the beginning of 2025.

Whereas recently in preparation for the illegal occupation of Gaza city Al Jazeera journalists Anas al-Sharif (28), Mohammed Qreiqeh (33), Ibrahim Zaher (25), and Mohammed Noufal (29) were recently murdered by Israeli drone strikes in Gaza;

Whereas today the IDF admitted to "mistakenly" attacking Nasser Hospital in Khan Yunis, this mistaken attack however seems insanely deliberate as a double tap which is a war crime occurred (after the first group of aid workers and journalists were attacked by an air strike, a second air strike was sent to hit the new aid workers and journalists who came to provide aid), there's already been 15 killed and five confirmed journalists casualties.

Whereas Al Jazeera and other international outlets have reported that at least 270 journalists and media workers have been killed in Gaza since October 7, 2023;

Whereas the killing of journalists undermines press freedom, violates international humanitarian law, and deprives the public of vital information during conflict;

Be it resolved that CUSA formally condemns and stands in solidarity with Palestinian journalists targeted and killed by Israel;



Be it further resolved that CUSA affirms its support for press freedom, journalistic integrity, and the protection of journalists in all conflict zones;

Be it further resolved that, to improve reach and public outreach, CUSA attempts to partner with groups like CJJP, JSOC, Carleton University Human Rights Society, and other applicable groups in both the creation of the statement(s) and posting/outreach for it to be posted on the CUSA Advocacy and CUSA Online accounts.

Be it further resolved that, CUSA's Divestment subcommittee or UAC are tasked with creating and sending out a CUSA endorsed letter to government officials calling on them to support press freedom, journalistic integrity, the protection of journalists in all conflict zones; and war crimes investigations.
