- CUSA's Climate Task Force hosted a Blue Bin Drive on Sept. 17 where we gave away 20+ free blue bins and recycling information to students
- CUSA's Climate Task Force attended a photoshoot on Sept. 14
- CUSA's Climate Task Force attended the "Draw the Line" Ottawa Climate March on Sept. 20 to show solidarity with climate protestors

Om Maradia – Vice President Finance/Treasurer

1. Key Priorities & Goals: Updates on Progress Toward Major Priorities

Student Discount Card Expansion

- ❖ The SDC program is off to a great start and has received overwhelmingly positive feedback from students. Over 5,500 cards have been distributed, and the program is increasingly being recognized as one of CUSA's most valuable student services. We have now successfully onboarded 88 businesses across 110+ locations a major milestone this year. I continue to monitor the program, manage inquiries, and collaborate with the Communications team, VPSL, and content creators to ensure strong promotion and visibility.

Financial Oversight & Forecasting

- ❖ The BDO audit is nearly complete. There was a delay due to the assigned auditors being away on vacation for three weeks, but we expect to receive the first draft of the financial statements by the end of the first week of



October at the latest. The university's deadline to receive audited results from CUSA is October 31, and we remain on track to meet it. I've started prioritizing our internal financial review and am currently revisiting the 2025–26 budget to identify and mention inconsistencies. Once the audit results are received, I will conduct a more in-depth financial analysis to inform strategic planning and prioritise my time with that.

Partnership Development

Ongoing efforts are being made to bring external vendors on campus and generate revenue by utilizing the Wing space. Currently in discussions with Nomad Posters to host a multi-day poster booth. I'm also coordinating with other potential vendors to explore partnership opportunities.

Generating Additional Revenue

I continue to work with the President, ED, and the realtor to lease underutilized CUSA spaces and develop sustainable revenue streams. However, we are still in the process of identifying viable tenants. This continues to be a challenge, as it has been difficult to find organizations willing to lease the space under university constraints. No major updates since last report.

Bounce Platform Integration

The Clubs Oversight Committee (COC) met to discuss how Bounce can support clubs and better streamline the process. The COC was impressed with Bounce and

how it can support clubs. This was followed by Bounce presenting at the last club president's meeting.

2. Highlights & Wins: Notable Successes Since the Last Report

SDC Program: We significantly exceeded all KPIs related to business partnerships — a major milestone for CUSA.

Student Engagement: Our Instagram account surpassed 1M views in the past 30 days, driven by a successful Fall-O campaign led by the VPSL.

Operational Efficiency: Notable reduction in unnecessary spending during Fall-O, reflecting a more strategic approach to event budgeting.

Continued progress in strengthening student engagement through impactful initiatives rolled out this year.

3. Challenges & Barriers: Key Issues and How They Are Being Addressed

Wing Space Vendor Access External vendors interested in using the Wing space must go through a lengthy university approval process. Despite the space being CUSA-managed, vendors are often denied access due to potential conflicts with existing university partnerships. The university's committee responsible for these approvals meets only once a month, meaning missed approvals can delay progress by weeks. We are actively working with the university to streamline this process, but coordination with multiple departments remains a barrier.

Bounce Integration Challenges

While Bounce has strong potential to streamline club operations and improve

engagement, onboarding remains delayed due to time constraints and limited resources. My focus remains on shifting the manual club funding process to an automated model through Bounce. However, this highly depends on the recommendation from the newly appointed COC members and overall support from clubs, who must see the value of integration.

- ❖ Collaborate with the new Student Experience Manager to revise and improve service centre budgets for the 2025–26 fiscal year.
- ❖ SIF and AFCOM application processes with VPI and VPSI, with recommendations to come to Council. Support the COC in the certification/recertification/funding of clubs for the upcoming academic year.

Historic Digital Milestone: CUSA reached 1.1 million views across platforms from August 24 – September 24. This is the highest engagement level ever recorded in a 30-day span since CUSA has had our current account!

Chonk Nation Hangout: Successfully planned and executed the first Chonk Nation Hangout of the year!

Breakfast Club Recognition: Was interviewed twice regarding the Breakfast Club initiative, helping raise awareness and interest across campus.

Multi-Club Collaborations: Strengthened partnerships with various clubs for both past and upcoming events, helping expand our reach and foster inclusive student spaces.

Event Execution: Attended and supported numerous events throughout September, ensuring strong CUSA visibility and student support.

Challenges & Barriers: Key Issues and How They Are Being Addressed

(C-61) Motion to Oppose Federal Bubble Zone Legislation

Whereas, [the Carney government is preparing to introduce new legislation that would create "bubble zones" around places of worship, cultural centers, schools and other community spaces](#). Similar to "bubble bylaws" this would make it an offence to "intimidate" or "obstruct" near these sites even if no threat is intended. This could be very easily abused to silence dissent;

Whereas, according to our [bubble Bylaw Policy](#): "CUSA opposes the implementation of any municipal Bubble Bylaw, or piece of provincial legislation that applies herein the City of Ottawa. In-line with opinions expressed by the Canadian Civil Liberties Association, CUSA believes that a Bubble Bylaw is inherently unconstitutional and may lead to violations of legitimate freedom of expression, guaranteed by the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. CUSA supports the right of all the student it represents to take part in peaceful demonstration without fear of arrest or detainment";

Whereas, CUSA's Bubble Bylaw Policy is currently narrow in scope, referencing only municipal and provincial legislation, yet it may reasonably be interpreted as opposing the creation of bubble zones, since the policy's stated [principles](#) affirm that:

"The Association is committed to:

- a) Promoting students' right to freedom of expression under the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms;*
- b) Ensuring that freedom of expression extends to all forms of peaceful protest in the City of Ottawa;*
- c) Ensuring that our advocacy work, including during political demonstrations, aligns with the existing priorities of the student body;"*

Whereas, the establishment of bubble zones would directly restrict students' rights to freedom of expression and peaceful assembly as articulated in both the Charter and CUSA's governing policies;

Whereas, Ottawa city staff warned that bubble bylaws carry serious constitutional risks, yet the federal government seems to want to entrench these risks into our Criminal Code, which would be disastrous;

Be it resolved, that CUSA formally oppose any attempt by the federal government to create bubble zone legislation that infringes on Charter-protected freedoms of speech, assembly, and protest;

Be it further resolved, that CUSA communicate this opposition publicly, and issue a statement outlining the constitutional risks of this legislation and affirming CUSA's commitment to protecting students' rights to dissent;

Be it further resolved, CUSA's advocacy team be alerted to this and take whatever action it deems necessary.

Be it further resolved, that this motion act as an interim extension of the Bubble Bylaw Policy to the Bubble Zones at the Federal level until Policy can be amended to align.

(C-62) Motion to Condemn the Bombings of the Global Sumud Flotilla

Whereas, the [Global Sumud Flotilla](#) a humanitarian mission of 50+ ships with delegations from 44+ countries is seeking to deliver aid into Gaza and has been constantly and repeatedly attacked in international waters which is a clear violation of international law;

And whereas, CUSA affirms the [statement](#) of UN experts who have urged Israel to cease all threats of harm against the Global Sumud Flotilla and to guarantee that it proceeds unhindered in its mission to deliver humanitarian aid to civilians in Gaza;

And whereas, among these experts, the UN Special Rapporteur on the situation of human rights in the Occupied Palestinian Territories, Francesca Albanese, [emphasized](#): “Civil society activists would not be compelled to risk their lives at sea if the General Assembly or Security Council had taken decisive action to ensure safe and unimpeded delivery of humanitarian aid into Gaza”;

And whereas, the experts further [stressed](#) that the very existence of the Flotilla is a direct consequence of the international community's failure to end Israel's unlawful blockade of Gaza and the catastrophic humanitarian crisis it has produced;

And whereas, the deliberate obstruction of humanitarian aid to Gaza may constitute an act falling under [Article II\(c\)](#) of the Genocide Convention,

namely “deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in part”;

And whereas, Canada’s stated commitment to a two-state solution, together with its obligations under the Genocide Convention (1948) and the Geneva Conventions (1949), bind it to defend humanitarian actors, hold violators of international law accountable, and prevent states from committing genocide;

And whereas, the [Foreign Ministers](#) of 16 countries (Libya, Bangladesh, Brazil, Colombia, Indonesia, Ireland, Malaysia, Maldives, Mexico, Pakistan, Qatar, Oman, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain and Türkiye) have written a joint statement calling on everyone on all parties to refrain from unlawful acts against the Flotilla, to respect international humanitarian law, and have warned that attacks in international waters or unlawful detention of participants will lead to accountability;

And whereas, [Italy](#) and Spain have already deployed naval assets to protect the Sumud Flotilla and its passengers, showing that state action is both possible and necessary;

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That CUSA unequivocally condemns the bombings of the Global Sumud Flotilla as unlawful attacks on humanitarian actors in violation of international law;
2. That CUSA calls on the Minister of Foreign Affairs and Global Affairs Canada to take immediate action to protect Canadian citizens aboard the Flotilla, to demand the safety of all humanitarian actors, and to pursue accountability for those responsible for committing violations under international law;
3. That CUSA formally endorse movements and initiatives dedicated to delivering humanitarian aid to Gaza, and commit to collaboration with campus, community, and international networks advancing this cause;
4. That CUSA reaffirms its solidarity with the Palestinian people and international humanitarian actors, and commits to amplifying their voices,

supporting their right to deliver aid free from attack, and opposing violations of international humanitarian law wherever they occur;

5. That CUSA attempts to partner with groups like C4P, Carleton University Human Rights Society, and other applicable groups in both the creation of a statement(s) reflecting the above points, and posting/outreach for it on the CUSA Advocacy and CUSA Online accounts.

Whereas, in the past month Israel has launched airstrikes at [Palestine, Syria, Yemen, Lebanon, and Tunisia within 72 hours](#);

Whereas, Israel has also launched strikes at Qatar amid crucial ceasefire negotiations, causing the [death of six](#) civilians, which constitutes a massive violation of international law;

Whereas, the [United Nations Independent Commission of Inquiry](#) has found reasonable grounds to conclude that Israel's military operations in Gaza since October 2023 constitute genocide, including "the killing of members of the group, the deliberate infliction of conditions of life calculated to bring about the physical destruction of Palestinians, and the imposition of measures intended to prevent births";

Whereas, this same UN report found that Israeli forces deliberately targeted civilians, medical staff, and humanitarian convoys, causing over 60,000 deaths in Gaza, including 18,000 children, and that these killings were carried out with genocidal intent;

Whereas, Israel's leadership has escalated genocidal rhetoric, with Prime Minister Netanyahu declaring [there will be no Palestinian state](#), while [WHO](#) confirms that 94% of Gaza's hospitals have been bombed;

Whereas, [the United Nations General Assembly recently passed a resolution calling for renewed efforts towards a two-state solution](#), which Canada Supported;

Be it resolved that the University Affairs Committee/CUSA call on the Canadian government to uphold its stated commitment to a two-state solution by publicly condemning Israeli strikes on Qatar and other violations of international law;

Be it further resolved that the University Affairs Committee call on the Canadian government to pursue diplomatic action to protect civilians, comply with Canada's obligations under the Genocide Convention, and support negotiations leading to a Free Palestinian state.

Whereas, the Ontario Network for Academic Accountability (ONAA) is a coalition of student groups, unions, and organizations advocating for transparency and accountability in the academic sector;

Whereas, ONAA calls for transparency and divestment, demanding that universities disclose their investments and divest from any holdings that enable oppression and systemic violence;

Whereas, ONAA affirms the principles of academic freedom and student rights, emphasizing that universities should be spaces of learning and

liberation rather than institutions prioritizing profit over human life or suppressing dissenting voices;

Whereas, ONAA stresses the accountability of institutions, holding academic administrations responsible for their actions and ensuring that they are not complicit in systemic oppression;

Be it resolved that, the Carleton University Students' Association (CUSA) become a signatory to ONAA;

Be it further resolved that, CUSA endorse and adopt ONAA's public calls, specifically:

1. We call on the Government of Ontario, the Ministry of Colleges and Universities, and the Council of Ontario Universities;
 - a) Implement a sector-wide policy of ethical investment that ensures an exclusion of all companies which are complicit in Israeli apartheid and war crimes, including weapons companies and surveillance firms.
 - b) Enact a policy of academic separation from Israeli institutions, suspending all exchange, research, and funding agreements with universities complicit in or directly supporting the Israeli military settlement enterprise, or systems of apartheid.
2. We call on the Government of Canada, Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (Global Affairs Canada), the Canada Revenue Agency, and the Canada Research Coordinating Committee:
 - a) Prohibit Canadian research funding (SSHRC, NSERC, CIHR, CFI etc) from being directed to or shared with Israeli military-linked institutions and organizations complicit in settler colonial violence;
 - b) Sanction extremist Israeli settler organizations and leaders, ban their fundraising, lobbying and recruitment operations within Canada;

- c) Revoke charitable status from Canadian Organizations that fundraise for the Israeli military or any entity involved in illegal settlement activity or the ongoing occupation and genocide of Palestinians.

Be it further resolved that, to improve reach and public engagement, CUSA seek to collaborate with groups including (but not limited to) the Carleton University Human Rights Society, Carleton 4 Palestine, Independent Jewish Voices, and other relevant organizations in the drafting, promotion, and dissemination of related statements through the CUSA Advocacy and CUSA Online account at the earliest opportunity.

(C-65) Motion to End Bounce Partnership

Whereas, serious concerns were brought forth during the September 27th All Presidents' Meeting regarding Bounce, including high ticket fees, handling of club and student data, and cost to the Association, with Bounce Operations Lead Scott Oakes quoting an entry-level rate of \$2 per student per annum, suggesting at minimum a \$50,000 recurring annual fee to the Association for three years;

Whereas, the CUSA Board was not, and has yet to be, informed about the partnership with Bounce, despite being the required signing authority;

Whereas, evidence supporting concerns with Bounce's business model and data policies were disclosed to at least three members of the CUSA Executive team since the week of August 18th;

Whereas, unbeknownst to CUSA Council or CUSA Board, at least three Executive meetings, including sessions of a recurring weekly meeting, were scheduled with Bounce after the disclosure of that evidence, including a

meeting on September 16th regarding the then-upcoming All Presidents' Meeting;

Whereas, due to the original intention to run club recertification through Bounce, with the presumption of making the use of Bounce mandatory, the role of Student Groups Administrator was not rehired until the week of September 8th, severely delaying club certification, recertification, funding, and other critical processes which are ordinarily the duty of Clubs Oversight Commission;

Whereas, despite backtracking on intentions of making the use of Bounce mandatory, club information was given to Bounce to create profile pages without the consent of clubs involved on August 1st; an email was intentionally sent to a large number of clubs CC'ing, rather than BCC'ing, club email addresses with the intention of sharing that information with Bounce on August 14th, and club information was once again used to create club profile pages on Bounce's platform without the consent of clubs on September 27th;

Whereas, the Queen's University Alma Mater Society (AMS) recently came under fire in a [September 19th Queen's Journal article](#) for allegedly mandating Bounce's use for club ticket sales, without having voted on this matter at the AMS Assembly, coupled with Bounce's perceived high \$1.30 flat + 2.9% ticket fee, resulting in a petition against Bounce signed by over 40 club leaders;

Be it resolved, that Council utilizes its power as the highest legislative body of CUSA to end any and all intention of partnership with Bounced Inc. immediately and indefinitely;

Be it further resolved, that evidence of further willing collaboration with Bounce during this pause may serve as cause for discipline and impeachment.

Science representing 22.19% of invitees, or 6.88 / 31;
FED representing 24.30% of invitees, or 7.53 / 31;

And whereas, FASS currently has 8 seats, being overrepresented by 0.83 seats, and Science currently has 6 seats, being underrepresented by 0.88 seats;

And whereas, currently, removing one seat from FASS and adding one seat to Science results in:

FPGA having 7 seats, or 0.29 seats over 6.71 / 31;
FASS having 7 seats, or 0.17 seats under 7.17 / 31;
Spratt having 3 seats, or 0.29 seats under 2.71 / 31;
Science having 7 seats, or 0.12 seats over 6.88 / 31;
FED having 7 seats, or 0.53 seats under 7.53 / 31;
